St Nicholas Church - Restoration of the Tower and Internal re-decoration

There has been a church on or near the present site of St Nicholas since the 7th century. The present church is believed to have been built in 1614, with the tower being added approximately 100 years later. During that time, the church building has been continually used as a place of worship and as a focus for the local community of Shepperton.

Many in our local community have memories of coming to St Nicholas in times of happiness on the occasions of baptism and marriage, or to listen to wonderful musical concerts but also in times of sorrow for funerals and memorial services for loved ones. Indeed, the past few weeks has seen St Nicholas become a focus for many people from the local community as they came into church for a quiet place of prayer and reflection following the news of the Queen's death.

Any building, due to the ravages of the weather and wear and tear needs to be maintained, and St Nicholas Church is no exception. Sadly over the years the structure and decoration have deteriorated and the time has now come when we need to undertake repairs in order to make the building secure for centuries to come.

The first phase of this work will be repairs to the Tower. Only when this work to the Tower is completed will we be able to start on the internal redecoration of the building. Preparatory work has already taken place to remove dangerous debris from the Tower and the structure should now be secure for the coming winter months. The cost for the additional repairs necessary to the Tower is currently estimated to be in the region of £150,000 - £200,000. Many believe that funding for the maintenance of our churches comes from the Government or heritage bodies but sadly this is not the case. Church maintenance is generally the responsibility of the individual congregation.

As a church we are currently investigating various ways of being able to raise these funds. Whilst this will include grant applications to various bodies and fundraising activities organised by church members, we are praying that many in the local community will also want to contribute to the repairs - of what many in Shepperton, I know – consider to be an iconic building and their local parish church.

We will be publicising our fund raising activities as they are planned and I look forward to welcoming many of you as you join in these activities with us. Some may prefer to give directly to the appeal and there will be many ways in which you can do so. The first of these will be a "Gift Day" on Saturday 15th October. Details of this can be found overleaf.

I look forward to working with our local community as we seek to raise the funds to restore St Nicholas for generations to come.

The Eco Corner looks at:

WAYS TO SAVE WATER



My writing teacher suggests: “don’t wash”. This is not entirely as serious recommendation.

The average household in the UK uses 142 litres per person per day. This is similar to the amount in Europe, but a fraction of the amount in the US where they use 1,350 litres per day. This July was the driest since records began, we had 35% of the expected rainfall in England.

So how can we use less?

Reduce, reuse, recycle is the mantra of the ecological lobby.

‘Reduce’ means using appliances maximally efficiently.

KITCHEN

So, full loads for dishwasher washing machine; use them on the more ecological settings.

Spot clean small stains to reduce the number of clothes washed.

Be more French by using the same plate/cutlery for a number of courses!

Use one-dish cooking recipes. This saves water, power and time.

Don’t overfill the kettle: this is a classic piece of advice that my husband finds impossible.

If hot water is slow to arrive eg Combi boiler, run the initial stream into a receptacle and use for plants, flush etc. this is good, clean water.

BATHROOM

Don’t leave the taps running at any stage and when you do run them run them into a small bowl or bucket which you can use to water flowers or flush toilets.

Take showers rather than baths. Shower into a bucket or put the plug in the bath and collect the water for toilet flush or garden if it doesn’t contain too much detergent.

Only run water when you actually need it, such as to rinse off in the shower or to clean your toothbrush. Never run water down the drain whilst waiting for warm again.

GARDEN

Have a source other than the mains to water the garden.

Some of us are lucky enough to be able to pump water from the river and some may have a borehole of their own.

Otherwise collect rainwater by all means possible, including water butts.

Water early in the morning, which is better for the plants.

Grow plants which are drought resistant such as aloes and other succulents.

Place plants which need a great deal of water by the side of the pond; or create a bog garden with a membrane which will conserve the water from draining away.

Don’t use too many flower pots: they require more frequent watering.



A large portion of the water that is wasted is from leaking pipes and taps. We can’t affect a great change in water companies’ use of clay pipes which crack, but we can make sure that our own plumbing is effective and efficient. Apart from anything else there is nothing more annoying than a dripping tap, except perhaps a nagging wife!

After a break of a few weeks our meetings restarted, just as we heard of the sad death of Queen Elizabeth II. Her Majesty was, as well as being our Monarch, the patron of the Scout Association and (on a personal note) in whose name I was presented with my Queen's Scout Award by the Lord Lieutenant of Lancashire in 1970. As all Cubs, Scouts and Leaders previously pledged allegiance and promised to "*do my Duty to God and the Queen*" we invited them all to re-affirm their Promise, now with reference to "*the King*" and flags were flown at 'half-mast', as required, until after the funeral. All activities took respectful account of the sad circumstances.

The Beavers started back with two new members, and a 'show and tell' evening where they had an opportunity to talk about Her Majesty before discussing what they had brought and/or their favourite hobbies. They cancelled their 2nd meeting which would have taken place on the day of the funeral and the planned hike/walk around Bedfont Lakes was moved back a week.

The Cubs also returned with some new members and a session to remind everyone of the traditional Pack ceremonies before taking part in an evening discussing 'acts of kindness' – looking at the kindness of the Queen and considered both individual and group acts of kindness that could be undertaken. Next, the Cubs prepared to present a short drama, in Sixes, which will eventually lead to the Entertainer Badge before moving on to the Pioneer Badge. This consisted of 2 sessions run by 'friend of the Pack', Keith Brewer (Deputy District Commissioner) which introduced the Cubs to some simple knots and lashings, rope making and let them use their new-found knowledge to construct some simple structures from sticks and string.

The Troop returned, also with new members, and a games night (rounders, football, French cricket and a wide game) before a final session to complete the Adventure Challenge and award the Badges to those who had completed the requirements. The Scouts then moved on to the Skills Challenge with Uniform ironing, badge sewing, washing up and some simple electrics (thanks to Paul McCracken). The second session saw them 'on-line' to research such subjects as alcohol, drugs, smoking and diet/sleep.

We have now held the meeting to approve the Annual Report and Accounts and have now been able to set a new date for the AGM – 17 October. At time of writing, we still plan to hold the meeting this year on *Zoom*, although that may change for 2023. Also, as I write this in late September we still have yet to finalise a decision about Fireworks Night

Girlguiding in Shepperton

It was with profound sadness that members of Girlguiding learned of the death of our Patron, Her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Our deepest sympathies went out to the Royal Family at this very sad time. Some units in Shepperton amended their meeting plans to allow their members to talk about the event and express their thanks for her years of service.

Margaret S of 2nd Shepperton Guides, one of our District Leaders, donned a purple hi-viz jacket outside Embankment tube station to help, support and answer questions from the public on the day before the funeral: a wonderful way to keep her Promise to serve the Queen, one last time!

1st Ashford Common Rainbows have so far welcomed two new members and commenced working for their *Rainbows Take Action for Nature* badge, which they hope to complete during *The Big Green Week* at the end of September. They have enjoyed a bug-hunt in the grounds of their meeting place, attempted a quiz about birds and made food for them to take home and hang in their gardens. Their final task will be to create posters declaring they are a "Champion for Nature".

Ironically, after postponing their final session of the summer term due to excessive heat, the opening joint meeting of this term for **1st Halliford Rainbows** and **Brownies** was conducted outdoors in a downpour. All the girls present showed true girlguiding resilience as they conducted an owl/ rabbit/ squirrel/ hedgehog/ badger hunt, mixed their own bubble solution to try blowing bubbles within bubbles to demonstrate the relations between girlguiding sections (though most efforts looked more like the Eden Project) before simply competing to see who could create the biggest bubble ever. The following week they began working towards their *Innovate Stage 1* and *2 Skills Builder* badges respectively, alongside the *Happy Hands & Funky Feet Challenge*. So far the Rainbows have created footprints to welcome new members, considered the functions of different types of footwear before working together to design their own, then moved on to use all parts of their bodies (not just their hands and feet) to create rhythms and tell stories. The Brownies achieved immense entertainment from a shoe-matching game before making their own hand-cream to practise the soothing effects of hand massage. Their next step was to become maritime engineers and experiment with the size and shape of sails to harness wind-power to transport sponge-scrubber boats.

So far this term **1st Littleton Rainbows** have shown their respects both to the Queen and to their former unit Leader by making memorial plaques and sparkly crowns, followed by a coronation ceremony for each of the girls, speaking about the Queen's importance and what they each knew about her. As a unit they are busy completing earlier badge-work enabling the presentation of both *Reflect.1* and *Feel Good.1 Skills Builders*, before starting a new theme for the term. **1st Littleton Brownies** have started working towards the *Communicate.2 Skills Builder* by discovering more about each other and learning how communication is more than just words, then working together to deliver the mail. They have even commenced preparations for their end-of-term Christmas show for their parents! **1st Littleton Guides** have also begun the term with getting-to-know you games and activities as they welcome both new Leaders and new members, and explore what the Promise means to them personally.








Scams Watch
